#### SCHOOL COUNCIL—PARENTS WE NEED YOU! THERE HAS NEVER BEEN A MORE EXCITING TIME TO BE ON SCHOOL COUNCIL

With 10 million dollars of building and grounds development being planned and constructed this year, it is a great time to be a part of our School Council. At Strathaird we are so very lucky, we have a wonderful School Council where parents and staff work together for the good of the school and all of our students and families.

Over recent years we have struggled to fill vacancies on School Council. It is now a matter of urgency, we must have a School Council but we can't run a School Council without parents. There are six parent vacancies for School Council which need to be filled (four vacancies are for two years and two vacancies are for one year). Two meeting nights per term is all that you need to commit to.

The School Council is involved in many aspects of the school including buildings and grounds, approving policies and monitoring finance. We encourage parents to please consider nominating, I feel sure you will find it a positive and rewarding way to contribute to the school.

## **SCHOOL COUNCIL ELECTIONS 2021**

All government schools in Victoria have a School Council. They are legally constituted bodies that are given powers to set the key directions of a school within state-wide guidelines. In doing this, a School Council is able to directly influence the quality of education that the school provides for its students.

This year there are four Parent Member vacancies with 2 year terms and two Parent Member with a 1 year term.

- The election process will commence with a call for nominations from Monday 8th Feb. Nomination forms can be obtained from the School Office.
- Nominations close and are due to the School Office by 4:00pm on Monday 15th Feb.
- The list of candidates will be posted outside the School Office on Wednesday 17th Feb.
- If there are more nominations than vacant positions, a ballot process will take place. Ballot Papers will be distributed to all families on Monday 22nd February.
- All Ballot Papers must be received by the closing of the Ballot at 4:00pm Monday 1st March.
- Counting Ballot and Declaring Poll will take place on Tuesday 2nd
- The first meeting of the newly appointed School Council will be held on Tuesday 9th March.

"Why I became a School Council parent member and what does it involve"

I first joined school council three years ago. As a full time working parent I was unable to drop my son off at school in the morning, pick him up at night, attend school assemblies or other parent activities. I felt disjointed from the school community and uninvolved with my sons education, so thought by joining school council I would feel more involved and I certainly have.

School council meets 8 times a year, that's twice a term for approximately 1 hour or less. That's less than 8 hours for the year. We typically discuss items such as; School Policy; Financials; Building & grounds development and maintenance; Uniforms; School Contracts; Education Plans & teacher development; Excursions and Camps; Parent & Friends activities and other general business. As a general member you can be as involved as little or as much as you want to be.

Through school council I have had the opportunity to meet and get to know other parents, some of our teachers and senior staff members. I've been able to get involved with decisions regarding the educational direction our school is striving for. I am very proud to be part of the Strathaird School Community and am extremely excited about the future upgrade and modernisation of our school, thanks to the \$10 million dollars we have received from State Government as a result of the forward thinking of our Principal Julie Kennedy and staff.

## PARENT -TEACHER INTERVIEWS

Parents will have the opportunity to meet with their child's teacher on Tuesday 16<sup>th</sup> February between 3:30pm. and 7:30pm, or Wednesday the 17<sup>th</sup> February between 3:30 and 5:00pm.

Parents need to book Interviews using Sentral. Letters will be sent home to all families next week. If you need help booking Interviews, please contact the School Office.

Interviews at this time of the year are designed to give parents an opportunity to inform teachers of any relevant background information which may be of assistance in developing class programs throughout the year. Background information may include your child's strengths and qualities, areas of concern, learning needs, homework expectations and how parents can assist learning.

#### **SMILE SQUAD DENTAL VAN**

The Victorian Government's school dental program—SMILE SQUAD—will be visiting our school in March. All students are able to have a dental check-up, preventative dental care and general treatment free at school. A consent form is being sent home today and parents are required to complete and sign the consent form and return it to school by Friday 12th February.

On Friday, each student will receive a gift bag containing a toothbrush and a tube of toothpaste.

The Smile Squad will first conduct all the dental check-ups in March and will later bring a Dental Van to perform treatments for students, where required. The Smile Squad will ring parents directly to discuss what treatment is required. The majority of treatments will not incur any out of pocket expense and parents will be advised if there will be any out of pocket expenses prior to the treatment being conducted.

#### PICK-UP AND DROP-OFF ZONE

The pick-up and drop-off zone on Community Parade is only for quickly picking up and dropping off students. When all motorists comply with the instructions the zone works very well but when people do the wrong thing, others naturally become frustrated.

You must not park there or leave your car there. The maximum time that your car can be in the zone is **two minutes**. Please also be aware the Council could be



here at any time ensuring motorists are doing the right thing.

## **SCHOOL GROUNDS**

The playground is supervised by teachers before school from 8.45 a.m., during morning recess, during the lunch break and after school until 3.30 p.m. Children should not arrive at school early unless they are going to the Before School Care Program.

#### **EARLY DISMISSAL / LATE ARRIVALS**

Students are not permitted to leave the school without being signed out. Students must be signed in or out of school at the school office between 9.00 a.m. and 3.15 p.m.

## Parents – Do you have one of the cards below?





You may be eligible for the Camps Sports & Excursions Fund (CSEF) of \$125 per child. Fill in an application form at the office for 2021. Applications close end of Term 1 2021.

One application needs to be completed per family with all students listed including 2021 Preps. Some student's cards are not eligible to receive the CSEF.





## **Medication Authority Form**

If your child requires any medication to be administered during the day (while at school), a purple medication authority form <u>must</u> be completed and signed by the parent/carer and submitted to the office. <u>Please do not place any medication in your child's bag.</u> (Asthma medication is allowed if there is a current Asthma Action Plan in place and your child's teacher has been notified.)

## All medication must come to the office in it's original packaging.

Spare Medication Authority Forms can be picked up from the office beforehand, especially if you feel your child may need medication keep at the school ie. Zyrtec for hayfever.

## **Asthma Action Plans**

Having a child with asthma can be frightening for parents and carers, but with good knowledge and management, it can usually be well controlled.


Asthma in young children is one of the most common causes of hospital admission and visits to the doctor in this age group. It's not easy to diagnose asthma at this age, as there are many different reasons for wheezing and coughing.

Once diagnosis is decided, treatment is often with trials of different doses of medication. The aim of good asthma management is to ensure that children can lead a normal healthy life, while taking only as much medication as is needed to keep them well, and avoid asthma flare-ups.

Every child with asthma must have an Asthma Action Plan which explains how to recognise worsening asthma, and what to do about it.

If your child has ever been prescribed asthma medication from a health professional, it is important that this school has the correct and up to date information on how best to support your child.

Please provide a current Asthma Action Plans signed by your child's doctor and return to the office as soon as possible.

## **School Enrolments**

Any CSEF credits you may have will be noted on excursion/incursion permission forms. If this is the case, we do not require payment and only ask that you sign and returned the permission form for your child.

## <u>Attendance</u>

Students and parents would know me as Ms Shelley from Sick Bay however I also look after and process student attendance and school absences.

Most parents would now be aware that Flexibuzz is no longer in use and that Sentral is where attendance communication can be made.

Families are required to notify the school of any non attendance. Please access the Sentral For Parents App to notify the school of your child's illness or other absence if they are unable to attend school.

Through this app, parents are also able to notify the school of a future absence and the reason for the absence. This is sent through to the school's absence registry and is then checked and processed by the admin team.

## Welcome back to SPS for 2021

It was with lots of big smiles and perhaps a few butterflies, that our students returned to school last week. It has been fantastic to see their happy faces in the classrooms and playground, while they enjoy getting to know their new teachers and classmates. As with anything new, the 'unknown' can be somewhat daunting. The way we as adults frame children's worries, can have a big impact on the outcome. Some level of anxiety, at starting a new year, can be expected and is considered a normal part of building resilience and facing challenges. Allowing your child to face uncertainty and in the process learn that they can manage it, is a huge learning curve and one which goes along way in building independence and inner strength.

- Later this week, your child will bring home a letter the outlines our school discipline procedures. This includes our school rules, consequences for breaches and how your child's class will reinforce and support positive behaviours. We ask that you support the school's efforts to maintain a high standards in regards to student behaviour, by discussing this letter with your child and returning it signed to their teacher. Rewards and celebrations may vary from class to class which reflects the agreement each group of students and their teacher have come to. Please return these signed slips as soon as possible.
- Our House Captains have also been given an important job already! They are on a daily look out at recess times for students who are displaying the values we love to see at S.P.S. For example; playing nicely, being friendly, having fun, showing kindness or empathy towards others. If your child comes homes with a special sticker that says 'I'm a Great Kid' a House Captain has noticed your child setting a good example and acknowledged them for it. All these attributes support the GEM principles (gratitude, empathy, mindfulness) included in our Resilience Project Program.

## **Our Resource Smart Journey**

This year we aim to continue to work towards reducing the amount of waste Strathaird Primary sends to landfill. ## 2021 Green Team

We are currently asking for passionate environmentalists in Grade 5 to apply to be part of the 2021 Green team. The Green team are an integral part of the sustainability program at Strathaird Primary by helping to organise and run a number of the schools environment programs and events such as Tree Planting day, earth hour, etc, running the Rubbish Free Lunch challenge, attending weekly sustainability meetings and gardening club, coordinating the our schools waste program as well as educating the wider school community by visiting grades, training the water, waste and energy warriors and speaking at weekly assemblies. In order to be chosen students must write an application explaining why they would like to be in the green team and and/or why sustainability is important to them. We will be choosing three students from each Grade 5 class. Please send applications to the office by Tuesday the 9th of February.



**Bausch + Lomb Recycling Program**—Recycle any brand of contact lenses and blister packs. No cardboard boxes they come in please, these can be recycled in your local cancel bin.

**Dish and Air Care Recycling Program**—Recycle your dish and air care packaging through this program. For example dishwashing liquid containers, air freshener, dish washer tablet or powder containers, air freshener spray bottles and plastic plug ins.

Oral Care Recycling Program—Recycle many of your oral care products through this program. Items that can be recycled include toothbrushes, the toothbrush part of electric toothbrushes, Toothpaste tubes, Mouthwash containers, Flossing containers and toothbrush packaging. Please note they will no longer be accepting the boxes toothpaste come in and ask that you recycle these in your council recycling bin.

Recycling at Strathaird

Strathaird is continuing to be a recycling drop off point for many of Terracycle and their partnered companies recycling programs. Terracycle offer a number of free recycling programs to schools which not only enable people to recycle hard to recycle items, also offer a points rewards system which can be used to donate money to our chosen charity Wildlife Victoria. We love being a part of the program and thank the school community for doing great job of bringing in your recyclable material to ensure it wont end up as landfill. We are hoping you will continue to do this and the collection boxes for the following recyclable items are currently located outside of the Library doors in the main building.

**Bread Bag Closure Program**— Any brand of bread bag plastic closure

**Zuru Bunch o Balloons**— Any of the following Bunch o Balloons brand items, Party balloons, plastic stems and ribbons, party and helium adaptors, water and party foil bags, water balloons, plastic stems, stem caps and water hose adaptors.

**Writing Instruments Program** — All writing instruments (except for wooden pencils, crayons and chalk) are accepted: Any brand of pen, felt tip, highlighter, marker, correction fluid pot (must be empty), correction tape, mechanical pencil and eraser pen regardless of their composition.

## Reading at Home with Young Readers

Most classrooms have commenced take-home reading by now, whereby students bring home books on a nightly basis to practise their skills. These books are usually easier than what your child will be reading in class with their teacher and there are important reasons for this.

Class teachers match students to appropriate levelled texts for classroom instruction. These texts are selected carefully in order to provide ample challenge for students but also where support can be offered for new skills and strategies to be gained. Reading at home has a different, but also important purpose. Please read below to find out why your child is bringing 'easy' books home.

## Why Easy Reading?

Readers are able to hear themselves read in a phrased and fluent manner, "reading like we're talking", when there are only a few or no challenging words or grammatical constructions. Reading fluently is a requirement for comprehension. Comprehension (getting the meaning) is what reading is all about, the reason we read.

Reading is a complex and dynamic problem-solving process using a variety of strategies. Development of any skill requires repeated practice. The skills and strategies the reader has in place will act as the foundation on which new learning can be built.

Easy books and books previously read, allow the reader to improve the speed and quality of the processing. Each time the reader has to stop to decode a word, the flow of language is lost and the meaning of the story is often suspended.

Readers are able to reinforce knowledge of high frequency words which are repeated in many different books. Studies show that children need to be presented with a word several times, in a number of contexts, in order to have real control of that word.

A familiar book is not a memorised book. It is a book that still challenges a reader to do some reading work, engaging with print and picking up new information. The practice of re-reading familiar books encourages confidence and fluency, and provides practice in bringing reading behaviours together.

Children who enjoy reading want to read more! Children who read everyday gain significant benefit over children who do not. Exposure to new words, concepts and topics improves performance in many areas of learning. Your support with this is crucial, particularly in the early years of schooling.

With any book, at any level, you can focus on comprehension.

Occasionally, stop, and have your child predict what will happen next.

Once or twice, as you read the book, stop and check for understanding, ask "who" and "what."

Having your child retell the story in their own words is a difficult, but necessary skill. The more practice they get, the easier it becomes.

Talk, talk, and talk about the books. Participate in this reading journey with your child; the pay-offs will last a lifetime!

## Remember our primary goal is for your child to enjoy reading!

## Instructions for accessing the Sentral for Parent App

- 1. **Download** the 'Sentral for Parents' app. Depending on your device, visit either the Apple App Store, or the Google Play Store.
- 2. Search for Strathaird Primary School. Tap Next.
- 3. **Sign in** using your Sentral username (your registered email address) and password (that you created when Registering). Tap Log In.
- 4. You are now ready to start using the app.

## If you have never registered on Sentral:

- 1.Click register here to register a new account. It will ask you to create a user name and password. Enter your email address as your username and create your own password. You will receive a verification email which MUST be verified in order to continue.
- 2. Once verified, log back into the app and use the access key provided by the school to link to your child's details. The access key will be created for you once your child is attending.


