We are very excited to be running this program and to have parents back helping in classrooms again. A big thank you to David Inturrisi and Jo Redi.


PANCAKE DAY

SCHOOL COUNCIL ELECTIONS 2023

All government schools in Victoria have a School Council. They are legally constituted bodies that are given powers to set the key directions of a school within statewide guidelines. In doing this, a School Council is able to directly influence the quality of education that the school provides for its students.

This year there are five Parent Member vacancies (4 two year terms and 1 one year term) on School Council.

- * The election process will commence with a call for nominations from **Monday 20th February**.
- * Nomination forms can be obtained from the School Office.
- * Nominations close and are due to the School Office by 4:00p.m. on Monday 27th Feb.
- * The list of candidates will be posted outside the School Office on Wednesday 1 Mar.
- * If there are more nominations than vacant positions, a ballot process will take place. Ballot Papers will be distributed to all families on **Monday 6 Mar.**
- * All Ballot Papers must be received by the closing of the Ballot at 4:00pm Monday 13th March.
- * Counting Ballot and Declaring Poll will take place on **Tuesday 14th March**.
- * The first meeting of the newly appointed School Council will be held on **Tuesday 21st March**.

STUDENT ACCIDENT INSURANCE, AMBULANCE COVER ARRANGEMENTS AND PRIVATE PROPERTY BROUGHT TO SCHOOL

At the beginning of a school year it is important to inform parents of the situation regarding injuries to students, Ambulance cover, and private property brought to school.

Parents should note the following:

The Education Department does not provide personal accident insurance or ambulance cover for students. Parents/carers s of students who do not have student accident insurance are responsible for paying the cost of medical treatment for injured students, including the cost of ambulance attendance or transport as well as any other transport costs. Ambulance costs from our school to Casey Hospital could be in excess of \$1000.

Parents/carers can purchase insurance policies from commercial insurers.

Likewise, the Education Department does not hold insurance for personal property brought to schools and it has no capacity to pay for any loss or damage to such property.

Private property brought to school by students or visitors is not insured and the Department does not accept any responsibility for any loss or damage. This can include mobile phones, toys and sporting equipment. As the Department does not hold insurance for personal property brought to school, students are discouraged from bringing any unnecessary or particularly valuable items to school.




STUDENT LEADERSHIP 2023



Our school cross country run has been organised for <u>Friday 3rd March</u>. Students in grades 3, 4, 5 and 6 will be involved in this event. If the weather is unfavourable on the day, an alternative date will be scheduled.

This competition will take place at school during scheduled sport sessions. All children will be participating in the event as it is a requirement of the Physical Education curriculum and it is also the process for selecting our interschool cross country team. If your child has medical reasons for not participating please provide a note to their class teacher to notify them of this.

Please ensure children wear appropriate footwear for running and it is also advisable that children bring along an extra drink for the day. Children are able to wear their **house colours** to school on this day; no singlet tops are permitted. Children are also required to bring their school sunsmart hat for school however they **WILL NOT** be competing in their hats. Class teachers will have sunscreen available for children to apply before their race if needed. If children are asthmatics they are required to bring their ventolin puffers or take any preventive medication as required. All children participating receive a ribbon and the top 8 students for each age group will be selected for the District Cross Country team.


An estimated 200,000 trees are bulldozed in Australia every day. That's 8,000 trees every hour!

Sentral for Parents App

The Sentral for Parents app allows families to:

- view academic reports
- explain past and upcoming student absences
- view calendar events
- book parent/teacher interviews
- receive sick bay notifications
- view school newsletters

as well as receive real-time notifications and messages from the school



Instructions for accessing the Sentral for Parent App

- 1. **Download** the 'Sentral for Parents' app. Depending on your device, visit either the Apple App Store, or the Google Play Store.
- 2. Search for Strathaird Primary School. Tap Next.
- 3. **Sign in** using your Sentral username (your registered email address) and password (that you created when Registering). Tap Log In.
- 4. You are now ready to start using the app.

If you have never registered on Sentral:

- 1.Click register here to register a new account. It will ask you to create a user name and password. Enter your email address as your username and create your own password. You will receive a verification email which MUST be verified in order to continue.
- 2. Once verified, log back into the app and use the access key provided by the school to link to your child's details. *The access key will be created for you once your child is attending.*

Changes to permission forms and payments in 2023

This year we are aiming to go as paperless as possible with our parent communications and permission forms for excursions, incursions and activities.

What does this mean for me as a parent?

- *Permission forms for excursions and incursions will now be completed digitally on the Sentral for Parents App.
- *Paper copies will no longer be sent home, so it is important that at least one parent in each family has access to the Sentral for Parents app and that you have **NOTIFICATIONS** turned on.
- *Sentral for parents will have a strict due date and no late permissions can be given once an event is closed.
- *Payments can still be made on the **QKR app (preferred)**, with EFTPos at the office or with cash, however cash payments for excursions and incursions can no longer be send via the classroom teacher.
- *All cash payments need to be made at the office between 8.30 8.50am OR afterschool.
- *CSEF can still be used for activities. We aim to notify families of their CSEF balance on the newsfeed of the Sentral for Parents App. (this used to be handwritten on the permission forms). If you need to check your CSEF balance at any time, please contact the office via phone or email.

A reminder that we do not keep change in the office, so if you wish to pay cash, please make sure that you have exact money.

Do you have a new parent email address?

Do you need to change your emergency contact details?

Time's up







Make good choices

Help children to think about the content they watch and how to manage their time on screens.

Message 1: Why do you like it?

Choosing to say kind things when connecting online is a life-long skill that can help prevent cyberbullying later on. The screen image can be a stimulus to discuss the types of things you should do when video calling,

Message 2: Use devices near a grown-up

Children need to be aware that digital technologies should be used with a grown-up nearby and in a shared space. Children should get used to the idea, from an early age, that devices should not be used in bedrooms.

Message 3: Time's up.

It is important to discuss with children how they will know when it's time to turn devices off and how they will transition to another activity.

Key questions when discussing this poster could include:

- · What do you like to play on devices? What makes you like it?
- Where are these people using devices? Where are you allowed to use them?
- · Have you ever been told you have been playing on a device for too long? How do you feel when that happens? What do you usually do?

Be kind

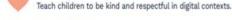

Message 1: Say kind things Choosing to say kind things when connecting online is a life-long skill that can help prevent cyberbullying later on. The screen image can be a stimulus to discuss the types of things you should do when video calling,

like saving hello with a smile.

Taking turns is a good way of managing time on screens and building self-regulation skills. The child in the background of this picture is sad because they have been left out of the game.

Message 3: Ask before you take a photo.

The little boy in is taking a photo of himself with his family. The screen image depicts another time when he is asking his family if they would like to be in the photo.

Key questions when discussing this poster could include:

- Have you ever called your family or friends on a computer or tablet like the people in the first photo? What do you think they are saying? How do you know?
- · Why do you think the boy in the middle photo looks sad? What could they do to stop him feeling sad?
- . Do you always ask someone if it is OK to take their photo before you take it? Why?

Some things should be kept private









Help children understand personal information and how it can be protected.

Message 1: Play with the games and apps that are yours.

Devices should be set up so children know which content is for them and that other games, programs or apps may not be suitable for them. The screen image shows the folder where the little girl can find the games and apps just for her use.

Message 2: Only talk with people you know.

This picture reminds children that they should only video call when a grown-up is helping them, and only speak to people they know.

Message 3 - Some things should be kept private.

In this picture the boys are creating an avatar with their Grandad. Avatars can be a practical way of showing children how they can keep their real name and identity private by creating a character to represent themselves in games

Key questions when discussing this poster could include:

- . Do you play on your Mum or Dad's phone, tablet or computer? Do you have a special place for your games and apps? How do you know what is yours?
- . Do you talk on the computer to your friends and family? Who helps you?
- . Why do you think the boy in the last picture looks confused? If you were going to create an avatar for yourself what would it look like? Why?

Teach children to ask a trusted grown-up for help with any issue using digital technologies.

Message 1: Tell a grown-up. It is really important for children to know that if something makes them feel worried, scared or sad when they are using a device they should tell a grown-up.

Message 2: Check before you tap.

Before children use a device, they should ask a grown-up. The picture shows the little boy asking if he can play a new video he has not seen before.

Message 3: You won't get in trouble

ldren are playing with digital technology often things happen that they didn't expect. It can be the same for grown-ups tool Children need to know that if something unexpected happens, they should tell a grown-up. They should be assured that the grown-up will know it was important for the child to share the problem even if it happened because they made a mistake.

Key questions when discussing this poster could include:

- Have you ever seen something that made you feel worried, scared or sad when you were playing on a tablet? Who would you tell? What do you think they would say?
- · Who do you ask before you play, watch or tap on something new on a device?
